The party with the single innings were decidedly the best batters, and those with the double unings were as decidedly the best fielders In truth it needed good batting to sustain the wickets against the balls delivered by Groom a d Wild, tir former of whom, with his sweeping left hand, planted his balls merringly under the toot of his adversary's bat, and the latter of whom sent his balls as if they had come from the mouth of a piece of ordnance. It is easy to suppose the care with which this match was played, by observing that the whole day's run only amounted to 216 notches
